 Children from two grades sharing one learning space, led by a single teacher – include a span of ages greater than one year. Curriculum is taught completely separately. While one group is being taught, the other grade is working independently without readily available access to the teacher. Limited opportunities for regrouping or personalization of learning for students. 	 Students from two grades share one learning space, led by a single teacher – include a span of ages greater than one year. There is one "curriculum" taught, blending the KSA's (Knowledgeskills-attributes) that both grades have in common and meshing common content; all the curriculum goals are covered. Enhanced opportunities for cooperative learning, pro-social interaction, flexible instructional groupings according to developmental needs. Usually for one school year. 	 Students from two grades share one learning space, led by a single teacher – include a span of ages greater than one year. There is essentially one curriculum taught, blending the KSAs from both grade levels and meshing common content. Children experience multiple years of instruction with a teacher; additional teachers or teacher assistants may be included in that learning space. For content areas such as science or social studies, there may be "flips" made. Excellent leadership, social, flexible academic grouping opportunities. 	 Students from one grade level are assigned to a teaching space led by a single teacher. A regular year of curricular instruction is followed. The students "loop" up to the next grade with the same teacher and group of peers, spending two grade levels with one teacher and the same classmates.
